Cillian's Story

"When I stepped onto the Pelican of London in August, I had no idea I'd disembark a week later having gained fast friends and invaluable skills.

I first heard of the voyage through scouting connections, more specifically, a group of Maltese scouts that were sailing as part of the Erasmus programme. As a scout myself, I thought this would be a fun opportunity, so I decided to join the voyage.

At first I thought it was going to be just me and the Maltese scouts on the voyage. However, when I arrived I quickly realised that there were a lot more people than just the scouts. The first thing that happened when we got on board was we were sorted into our watches and assigned a cabin. The cabins were cramped, to say the least. They held six people and a small bathroom in an area around the size of a parking space.



Unfortunately for the first night the weather was not in our favour for sailing, so we stayed moored in Dublin port. However, this gave us a lot of socialising opportunities, for example, playing icebreakers out on deck.

Fortunately, the next few days were a lot more productive. Over the course of the next 6 days we sailed north to Bangor; then across the Irish sea into Laxey bay; down into Douglas and then finally back across to Dublin.

While out at sea, mobile reception is spotty at best. For some amongst us, it was like going cold turkey.



I found it quite nice to get a break from social media and doomscrolling. The watch roster ensured that you were kept busy all week, and also made for good small talk (If there's one popular topic, it was the universal hatred of the midnight shift). Everyone looked forward to their galley days, where they could miss their watches for a day and help in the galley. We learnt a lot about cooking and maintenance of the ship over the voyage, but all of the chores were much easier done in calm weather rather than rough waves!

Sailing on the Pelican has to be one of the best weeks of my life. If I could do it all over again, I would, hands down. Not only have I learned practical skills such as navigation and rules of the sea, I've also gained some scientific knowledge courtesy of the on-board scientist: Sharkey Markey from

the Shark Trust; I've also made some really good friends. I was half expecting to never see my crewmates again after the voyage, but just recently me and a few friends met back up together and reminisced about the days of old (two months ago), and I have no intention of letting those friendships grow cold.

So, if you asked me if you should go on a voyage, I'd say yes. Absolutely. Hands down, do it. I won't need to tell you why afterwards."

Morgan's Story

"Sailing on the Pelican of London was one of the most: memorable, incredible, and stunning things I have ever experienced. I was privileged enough to gain a place on the voyage from Dublin along the Welsh coast and then returning to Rosslaire.



I had previously done some dinghy sailing but I had no experience with bigger boats, especially not a tall ship. Luckily the crew were amazing and always there to help if I had a question. They were so supportive and encouraging throughout the entire voyage. I remember climbing the rigging (one of my favourite activities) and I chose to climb to t'gallantthe second tallest sail on the mast. I was helping to take the sails down, but it was allot more difficult than I had anticipated. While it took me a while to get the hang of untying the ropes and then re-tying them in clove hitches without getting anything tangled or trapped the crew were patient and allowed me the time to figure out how to do it properly without rushing me.

Apart from the wonderful staff everyone I met was so lovely. Not once did I feel anxious or worried about talking to people or making friends, as everybody on board made it such an easy thing to do. I had been very nervous before hand because I thought people might not like me, or that I wouldn't get on

with the people I met. It turned out however, that lots of people were in the situation which made it easy to relate to them and we all became fast friends. Having people to talk to was crucial for helping me get through my morning watches at 4am, and my watch group were all genuinely lovely and I'm glad I

got to meet them.

This voyage was honestly a life changing experience. The science we did on board broadened my knowledge of the sea and the creatures that live in our waters specifically. We got to do loads of sea surveys and I spotted so many dolphins it was unbelievable. All of the lessons were super interesting and fun, they never felt like work. I had such a fantastic time and would definitely recommend it to anyone who gets the opportunity, I already loved sailing before but this experience has helped me realise

that I want to continue sailing in the future and hopefully have the opportunity to work with ships. I loved the staff and I want to thank them all for providing such an incredible opportunity for me."


